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6th International Section Convention

The International Education Development Foundation (FDEI), created 40 years ago at the 'Lycée International de Saint-Germain-en-Laye', organized its 6th Convention on the 21st and 22nd of March 2018 at the Conseil de la Région Grand Est in Strasbourg. This event was patronized by French President Emmanuel Macron and Jean-Michel Blanquer, Education Minister who participated by video.



The Vice President of the Région Grand-Est, welcomed an audience of almost 180 representatives from India, Saudi Arabia, Italy, Switzerland, Luxemburg, Germany, Sweden, the Netherlands, Belgium, the United Kingdom, USA, Morocco and France. The Rectrice d'Académie de Strasbourg then gave her speech. The international section heads and teachers, principals, inspectors from partner countries and France, embassy representatives, parent associations and local education authorities, attended presentations by schools from Strasbourg

offering international sections (2 primary, 2 collèges, 1 lycée); these presentations put forward best practice and new ideas. In a second phase, questions were raised during three workshops entitled "Primary", "Diplomas at a time when the French baccalauréat is being reformed", and "Accessibility and reputation of international sections". Propositions were made and François-Xavier d'Aligny, President of the FDEI, has since presented these propositions to the deputy ministerial private secretary. This intervention should result in an appointment with the Minister. Visits to the European Council and European Parliament, as well as a reception at the Strasbourg Town Hall added a special dimension to this convention. These enjoyable moments facilitated the creation of numerous contacts. The Aseica 8 person delegation largely contributed to the success of this event, not only from a logistical point of view but also by organizing certain workshops. The FDEI, the only meeting platform for international section players will soon publish information on this congress, on its website www.fdei.org. Washington Trip

The aim of the trip was to expose the students to many of the concepts, which they will cover during their Terminale year in History and Geography and English, so many, many museums and historical monuments were visited. The group stayed in a centrally placed hostel within walking distance to the National Mall and the group walked A LOT - they averaged 15km a day! Students visited the newest Smithsonian museum - the National Museum of African American History, the Air and Space Museum, the National Zoo, Newseum to study the influence of the media and the National Portrait Gallery. They also rode to Arlington Cemetery where they visited the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and the graves of JFK and Robert Kennedy, toured Georgetown University and the historic Georgetown area and attended a theater performance and a theater workshop on Shakespeare's The Tempest. However, the highlights of the trip for many students was meeting and speaking with Brigitte Macron, who was on a state visit and happened to "bump" into our students as they exited the Renwick Art Gallery before (...)

heading to a baseball game where they watched the Washington Nationals. It was a fantastic trip where many great memories were made and the students learned a lot about US and world history.

My father worked as a mechanic in the Air Force,

When he died, I stole my father's wristwatch. I listened to the beating heart of the watch. The heart of the watch kept beating long after my father's heart stopped beating. Somewhere, the son of the man who stole my father's wristwatch in the Air Force holds the watch to his ear and listens to the heart of the watch beating. He keeps the watch in a sacred place where no one else will hear it. So the son tries to resurrect the father. The Bible tells the story wrong. We try to resurrect the father. We listen for the heartbeat and hear the howling.


